VICTORY AT PRI PARK

JOY RALPH RIFLES HOME TO EARN THE HOOPS 3 POINTS AGAINST PEAMOUNT UNITED

PEAMOUNT UNITED, BEATING
THE GREENOGUE GIANTS 1-0 IN

MINUTES OF FOOTBALL.

CHRISTINE ALLEN REPORTS FROM PRL PARK.

Just four days out from The Peas round one Champions League Qualifier against Belarus' FC Dinamo-BSUPC, there was an understandable buzz at PRL Park.

Underneath the waning heat of a late August sun, supporters journeyed beneath the tunnel to the main pitch, conversing animatedly.

Rovers donned their classic black jersey with the turquoise sash design while The Peas sported their traditional dark green shirt and white shorts.

United were spirited in the opening twenty minutes and had success via Becky Watkins on the right wing - her one v one battle with the tenacious Savannah McCarthy a real treat for the crowd underneath the compact main stand who made themselves heard as both duelled.

Watkins and Jessica Fitzergald had success early on both respective channels, swinging ball after ball into the box which prompted skipper Aine O'Gorman to track back for Rovers and make a number of crucial interceptions.

"Get higher!" Amanda Budden roared as Fitzgerald drove forward once more and popped off a shot with her right that the goal minder would collect.

Chloe Moloney and Jetta Berrill looked solid at the back whenever The Hoops did initiate an attack - Maria Reynolds exploiting space as McCarthy pushed high.

That was until the electric charge of Lia O'Leary blitzing past not one, not two but three Peamount players (who hit the deck as the number 11 weaved beyond their reach) sparked The Hoops to life.

"Cmon!" Budden exclaimed in approval as the marauding wingers' quick footwork sent each Pea sliding helplessly to the grass.

The breakthrough for Rovers came minutes later when Maria Reynolds, who moved with the self-assuredness of a player who has mastered their craft, played a visionary over the top pass to Stephanie Zambra who did well to keep the ball in play and drive it across the goalmouth.

You never doubted Joy Ralph as the Greenhills native beat the green shirt to the ball, firing first time from an awkward angle with her left boot into the bottom right hand corner.

The number 19 nearly made it two with a pirouette and fire moments later - The Peas relieved to see the strike trickle past the left hand post.



A Watkins counter cross almost found its target minutes later but Ellen Dolan was unable to head it cleanly on target. In the heart of the park, Scarlett Herron and Aoife Kelly put in a real shift, bossing the midfield like Alan Sugar in the boardroom of The Apprentice.

Captain Karen Duggan, who was a worthy foe for Herron, cranked her neck to the left and right following a strong challenge by the number 20 - the Monaghan native fighting tooth and nail for every ball as Kelly flaunted her technical prowess.

"There's too many kickouts we're not winning!" A Peas defender remonstrated with her teammates as Rovers continued to dominate.

A fine save from Niamh Reid Burke on the stroke of half-time kept Peamount in it - McCarthy releasing Ralph who beat both Berrill and Moloney for pace to cut back a cross for her skipper who laid it off for the number 10.

Zambra saw the opportunity before the tee off formed in O'Gormans mind and raced to place herself within reach, firing with power towards the bottom right but Peamount's goal minder parried it clear.

With Oasis 'Live Forever' ringing in the ears of the PRL Park faithful, the reigning champions started the second half strong and this was applauded by foreman James O'Callaghan from the sidelines.

A point blank strike from Ellen Dolan was somehow kept out of the net as Peamount began to be

possession - Peamount snapping for the
equaliser at their heels.

Keep the ball!" The Douglas native remonstrated as substitute Keri Letmon began to light up the right wing.

At the other end of the pitch Ralph chased down every long ball in an attempt to resuscitate Rover's vitals in attack, her press unrelenting as the clock ticked towards full-time.

Peamounts best chance to equalise came in the 64th minute when the ball was pickpocketed from Kelly by a lively Fitzgerald and laid off for Dolan who's placement was just a couple of inches shy off the right corner to cause the Rovers goal minder any trouble.

As the minutes passed, Burke expressed dissatisfaction to the referee with the lack of service on ball rotation - a nod to her frustration as the final whistle loomed closer.

"Everytime ref!" The Clonsilla native exclaimed moments later, as Katie O'Reilly hovered within her line of sight on the kick out.

The introduction of former DLR Dynamo Michelle Doonan was not enough to save a point from the fixture for Peamount, who ultimately succumbed to a 1-0 defeat to Rovers.

With that said, the passages of play executed in the first half should be recognised by those outside of Dublin 7 for what they were.

And that is, Quality.

The Gypsies roamed unshackled in the first 45' and were a handful for The Hoops on the wings, Sarah McKevitt and Katie Malone propelling forward as the Dalymount turf became their runway.

Against a side without the formidable centre-back partnership of Maria Reynolds and Jessica Hennessy, Bohs are sure to have run R!OT as their wingers cut inside and sought to stun.



FOLLOWING THEIR 4-0 DEFEAT TO ROVERS AT DALYMOUNT, KEN KIERNAN'S BOHEMIANS ARE NO DOUBT DETERMINED TO RETURN THE FAVOUR ON THE HOOPS HOME SOIL.

Since their 4-0 defeat to Shamrock Rovers at Dalymount Park in June, Bohs have beaten All-Island Cup Champions (still hurts) Galway United, reigning league champions Peamount United in the FAI Cup and held title contenders Shelbourne to a 1-1 draw under the glare of the TG4 cameras.

A defensive shapeshifter, Sarah Power is instrumental to the maintenance of Bohs structure - her physical presence and composure invaluable to The Gypsies as they carve out narrow wins over the opposition.

Not shy of a strong challenge, Power will no doubt look to keep Ralph, O'Leary and O'Gorman in check.

Yet Powers strengths are not limited to one section of the turf.

Look at this pass from Sarah McKevitt to McEvoy. Swerves it across the baize as if she were Ronnie O'Sullivan mid flow state on a 147. Malone likes to pick a pocket or two.

Kelly excels with her ball control, vision, and creative play - a triple threat of a triad that allows her to influence the tempo of the game.

STRIKING POWER

Game Time: 44:41

In Rovers Women FAI Cup battle against Shels in late August, Kelly's missile from an obtuse angle registered as a solid 7 on the Richter scale. Only the woodwork could deny the youngster from firing Rovers into the lead on the stroke of half-time.

CONFIDENCE

Throughout that gruelling battle against The Reds, Kelly dropped the shoulder time after time, duping experienced defenders and mastering Tolka talent Christie Gray on the left lane.

ROVERS V PEAMOUNT - EXTRA TIME MATCH REPORT



It's October 2013.

One Republic's 'Counting Stars' sits atop the charts and a sensational strike from a 25 year old female Irish footballer has caught the eye of both Cristiano Ronaldo and Lionel Messi

(You may have heard of them.)

Earning runner up in the 2014
FIFA Puskás competition for the
best goal of the year, Stephanie
Zambra's (then Roche) deft skill,
ball control and clinical finish for
Peamount United against the
Wexford youths soared the
Shankill shooter to international
acclaim - her wonder goal caught
on camera by former manager
Eileen Gleeson.

Yet as amazing an achievement as
Zambra's nomination was
(for both women's
football in Ireland and the
game on a global stage)
this piece won't refer to
it again.

Long before Cadbury promoted women's football with the FAI, the self confessed Manchester United supporter carved out 58 international appearances and 14 goals for the girls in green.

Zambra in addition has played in the US (with Houston Dash), England (for Sunderland Ladies) and Italy (with the Serie A side Florentia.)

To distill The Hoops playmaker into one grainy (albeit brilliant) sequence of play would serve only to discredit her footballing achievements - both past and present.

In this feature we will examine the work ethic, skill, drive, wisdom and talent that the thirty-five year old Shamrock Rovers play maker continues to shed in abundance.

1) STRIKING ACUMEN

There is a moment, when Zambra, poised at the edge of the box, appears to slow down time. This is one.

Here we see Joy Ralph charging forward before laying the ball to her skipper Aine O'Gorman.

The Hoops number 13, who has been anything but unlucky for the Dublin 24 women cuts the ball back to Zambra who's eyes have never once left the ball.

An intake of breath from the West Stand as Zambra sets herself up with one touch before firing with pinpoint accuracy towards the bottom right hand corner.

Only a sublime save from Galway United's Jessica Berlin can prevent Zambra from netting the winner and securing All-Island Cup Glory for The Hoops.

2) TEMPERAMENT

In what was a tense FAI Cup quarter-final between Shelbourne F.C and Rovers at Tallaght Stadium, Zambra utilised her experience urging calm in heated moments.

Watch how Zambra (far right of screen) signals for her teammates to settle in the moments after Pearl Slattery's second yellow card and subsequent dismissal.

From injuries to taking her place at the forefront of a senior international strike which demanded better conditions for our countries female footballers, there is not a moment of pressure that the Shankill native has wilted beneath.

Zambra in addition shook the Tribeswomen when she buried her All-Island Cup spot kick into the bottom left hand corner. Pressure makes diamonds.

3) BALL CONTROL

If the viral FIFA Puskás Award nominated goal was not enough evidence, watch how a loose ball from Pea Becky Watkins is pick pocketed by Zambra who does really well to control the ball and flick it to Lia O'Leary on the left lane.

4) WORK RATE/ASSIST RATIO

Zambra's hold up play reminds me of the Arsenal Women play maker Alessia Russo.

Like the Gunner, Zambra's value to Rovers goes far beyond hitting the back of the net as she uses her strength and perseverance to carve out assists.

You will often see the number 10 feeding Joy Ralph up top with a deft lob over the top of defenders heads or via a sharp cut back cross.

Zambra executed a visionary ball over the heads of the Sligo Rovers defenders as The Hoops put on a show at The Showgrounds back in June (report here https://www.extratime.com/articles/33741/wloi-report-sligo-rovers-1---4-shamrock-rovers/)

In Rovers 1-0 win away to
Peamount last weekend (on
foot of which Zambra earned
a spot in the LOI Women team
of the week) watch how
Zambra chases Maria Reynolds
long ball and cuts ahead of
the pacey Jetta Berril before
cutting a clinical cross back
inside.

'AT LAST!' SHAMROCK ROVERS STRUT THEIR STUFF IN DUBLIN 7 AND PUT FOUR PAST THE BOHEMIAN FASHIONISTA'S TO SECURE THEIR FIRST LEAGUE WIN OF 2024. A 1,011 strong crowd streamed through the Dalymount Park turnstiles on what was a glorious Saturday afternoon to support the Bohemians women in their Dublin Derby clash against Shamrock Rovers.

Stephanie Zambra would make her first start for Collie O'Neill's outfit since their 4-0 win over DLR Waves at Tallaght in April, while for Bohs, Tiegan Ruddy and Alannah McEvoy were named to face their alma mater along with Bohs May Player of The Month, Savannah Kane.

The visitors started on the front foot with Joy Ralph and Zambra on the hunt early doors - skipper Aine O'Gorman linking up well with Lia O'Leary from right to left as the visitors enjoyed the lion's share of possession.

Melissa O'Kane once again looked a different class in the centre of the park as the number 22 turned Katie Malone in the 17th with a feint straight out of Madison Square Gardens.

Ken Kiernan's backline were impenetrable however in the opening forty-five and Rovers were forced to shoot from outside the D.

Bohs looked dangerous on the counter, their one touch football a real pleasure to witness for both the home fans and the neutral as their wingers looked to exploit the channels.

Katie Malone and Sarah McKevitt were a formidable challenge for The Hoops centrebacks, yet Maria Reynolds and Jessica Hennessy were measured in their movements, gliding in sync to snuff out the danger.

KATIE MALONE AND SARAH MCKEVITT WERE A FORMIDABLE CHALLENGE FOR THE HOOPS CENTRE-BACKS, YET MARIA REYNOLDS AND JESSICA HENNESSY WERE MEASURED IN THEIR MOVEMENTS, GLIDING IN SYNC TO SNUFF OUT THE DANGER.



Scarlett Herron sat at left-back and held her own against McKevitt - the Monaghan native very much on the ball rather than off it for the women in green and white this weekend.

Zambra would signal for Ralph to push higher up the pitch as Rovers recovered from another Bohemian assault - the number 10 executing an audacious attempt on goal in the 29th when a visionary long ball from Hennessy landed at her feet.

The strike would float over Rachael Kelly's crossbar but the intent was a reminder of the magic that Zambra, at the age of thirty-four, can conjure with her boots.

Rovers continued to press but were unable to convert in the final third

As the shade fell across the pitch at Dalymount a shot from Ralph caused havoc in the box and Zambra was quick to pounce - only the iron will of Murphy denying the Shankill native from netting the opener.

The Bohemian women received an appreciative applause for their efforts as they sauntered back to the dressing room at half-time, the game all square at 0-0.

Rovers started the second half with the intensity of a team 1 goal down with five left to play.

Zambra had the first chance on goal, driving her foot as if it were a #1 wood driver through the ball only to see it hit the Bohs goal minder square.



Smith and Murphy would keep their side afloat as Rovers unleashed wave after wave of attack to no avail.

hat was until The Hoops centreback, Jess Hennessy, grabbed the game by the scruff of the neck and charged forward, her tall frame dancing past three.

Winning her side a corner, it was only fitting that the Mullingar native would score The Hoops first.

As O'Gorman whipped the set-piece into the box, Hennessy charged into view as if from the ether, her towering header powering the ball into the top right bin in the 50th minute.

The story could have been very different at Dalymount with Bohs creating two significant chances to level the contest across the tenminute spell before Rovers' secured a second in the 63rd.

The first opportunity came when Aoibhe Brennan won an aerial header that slipped Malone through on goal. Lawless to her credit was quick to react and sprinted off her line to clear the ball high and into the rafters of the Jodi Stand.

McKevitt would strike from an obtuse angle in the 58th but the Rovers stick minder did well to parry the number 8s attempt on goal clear.

O'Kane would secure the visitors 2nd, the power behind her long range effort beating the Bohs captain who could only watch as the ball bounced behind and across her goal line.

The needle between Ralph and Smith was on display for the remaining half hour as both attacker and defender attempted to outsmart the other – both players appearing to enjoy the competitive edge as they flashed a smile.

Rovers cruised to a third in the 70th when O'Gorman sprung to meet a deft cross at the end of an O'Leary whip - the skipper guiding the ball with her head into the bottom right-hand corner.

The crowd at Dalymount became subdued as the final twenty wound down and The Hoops sought to finish in style.

A glancing header from O'Reilly in the 81st would secure their 4th (and the talented youngsters first senior contribution) as the Rovers gears clicked in unison.

The visitors showed no signs of letting up and would make four substitutions in the final ten, Under 17s Academy stars Ella Kelly and Anna Butler amongst those to take to the turf.

Shauna Fox would also make an appearance alongside the quick footed Jaime Thompson and almost make it five with her head.
